



## THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN BHAKTI AND KARMA

The following conversation between His Divine Grace A. C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada and some of his disciples took place in June 1974 during an early-morning walk in Geneva.

**Disciple:** What does Krishna mean when He says in the *Bhagavad-gita* that we should be desireless? **Srila Prabhupada:** He means that we should desire only to serve Him. Sri Chaitanya Mahaprabhu said, *na dhanam na janam na sundarim kavitam va jagad-isha kamaye:* "I don't want wealth. I don't want followers. I don't want beautiful women." Then what does He want? "I want to serve Krishna." It is not that He says, "I don't want this, I don't want that. Let Me become zero." No. **Disciple:** The nondevotee also says he knows what he wants, but he says, "I can accomplish the same good results without Krishna."

**Srila Prabhupada:** Then he is a fool, because he does not know what "good results" really are. Today he is struggling very hard for one "good result," but



tomorrow he'll desire something else, because he must undergo a change of body when he dies. Sometimes he's taking the body of a dog and desiring one "good result," and sometimes he's taking the body of a demigod and desiring another "good result." *Bhramatam upary adhah:* he's wandering up and down the universe, just like . . . what is that? **Disciple:** A ferris wheel.

Srila Prabhupada: Yes. Sometimes he is rising to an elevated position, and then again he must come down and take the body of a dog or hog. This is going on. brahmanda bhramite kona bhagyavan jiva guru-krishna-prasade paya bhakti-lata-bija "After wandering up and down the universe for many lifetimes, one who is very fortunate comes to devotional life by the mercy of the spiritual master and Krishna." [Chaitanya-charitamrita, Madhya 19.151]

Disciple: Well, the nondevotee will say, "We are also doing good service. You are distributing food, and we are also opening schools."

that teach Krishna consciousness, while your schools are teaching illusion. The problem is that the rascals cannot understand the difference between *bhakti* [devotional service] and karma [material activity]. *Bhakti* looks like karma, but it's not karma. In *bhakti* we also work, but for Krishna's sake. That is the difference.

**Srila Prabhupada:** Yes, but we are opening schools

For example, Arjuna fought in the Battle of Kurukshetra, but because he fought for Krishna he is accepted as a great devotee. Krishna told him, *bhakto* 'si me . . . priyo 'si me: "Arjuna, you are My dear devotee." What did Arjuna do? He fought, that's all. But he fought for Krishna. That is the secret. He did not change his fighting capacity as a warrior, but he changed his mentality. At first he was thinking, "Why



shall I kill my kinsmen? Let me leave the battlefield and go to the forest and become a mendicant." But Krishna wanted him to fight, so at last he surrendered and did it as a service for Krishna. Not for his own sense gratification, but for Krishna's sense gratification. **Disciple:** So sense gratification is there even in devotional service?

Srila Prabhupada: Yes. A *karmi* works for his own sense gratification, and a *bhakta* works for Krishna's sense gratification. That is the difference between a nondevotee and a devotee. Sense gratification is there in either case, but when you work for your personal sense gratification it is karma, and when you work for Krishna's sense gratification it is *bhakti*. *Bhakti* and *karma look similar*, but the quality is different.

Another example is the behavior of the *gopis* [Krishna's cowherd girlfriends]. Krishna was a beautiful boy and the *gopis* were attracted to Him. They wanted Him as their lover, and they went out from their homes in the middle of the night to dance with Him. So it appears that they acted sinfully—but they did not, because the center was Krishna. Therefore Chaitanya Mahaprabhu



recommends, *ramya kacid upasana vraja-vadhu-vargena ya kalpita:* "There is no better mode of worshiping Krishna than that practiced by the *gopis.*" But the rascals think, "Oh, this is very good. Krishna danced in the middle of the night with other men's wives, so let us also gather some girls and dance, and we will also enjoy like Krishna."

This is a gross misunderstanding of Krishna's pastimes with the gopis. To prevent this misunderstanding, Srila Vyasadeva has devoted nine cantos of the *Bhagavatam* to describing Krishna's position as the Supreme Personality of Godhead. Then he gives a description of Krishna's behavior with the gopis. But the rascals jump immediately to the Tenth Canto, to

Krishna's dealings with the *gopis*. In this way they become sahajiyas [pseudo devotees].

**Disciple:** Will such persons experience a change of heart, since they're somehow or other associating with Krishna?

**Srila Prabhupada:** No. Kamsa also associated with Krishna—but as an enemy. That is not *bhakti*. *Bhakti* must be *anukulyena* 

krishnanushilanam: favorable devotional service. One

should not imitate Krishna or try to kill Him. That is also Krishna consciousness, but it is not favorable and therefore it is not *bhakti*. Still, the enemies of Krishna get salvation, because they have somehow or other thought of Krishna. They get impersonal liberation, but they are not allowed to enter into the pastimes of Krishna in the spiritual world. That benediction is reserved for those who practice pure loving devotion to Krishna.



# **HOW I CAME TO KRŞŅA CONSCIOUSNESS**

#### MY PATHWAY TO KRISHNA



It seems that my coming to Krishna has taken me my whole life. As I look back on all my wasted years I can see the many opportunities Krishna gave me to put my life together, that I let pass by.

My early years were spent as a military dependent living around the world. The choice in worshiping God was broken down into Jewish, Catholic or Protestant. By the time I was out of elementary school my parents had stopped taking me to the Protestant services. By high school I felt that void and started going back on my own. I was active in the church but there was something lacking. I was confused in the teachings and just couldn't believe all I was being taught. I also couldn't find a role model in the church to help direct my life. My life started spiraling downward. Living in Germany I had easy access to alcohol. Drinking became my main focus. I returned to the states to start college but didn't last a semester in college before dropping out and joining the army. When I returned from Vietnam I decided to try college again. By this time I was drinking heavily and instead of making it to classes I spent my time in a local bar.

I had lost my faith in everything. Well, not quite everything, I still believed in God. I had no idea of how to worship God or anything about Him, but even as messed up as everything in the world seemed, I still believed there had to be a God. I had left Christianity behind and was becoming attracted to Zen Buddhism.

My first contact with Krishna devotees wasn't a physical contact but a very memorable one. I was living in College Park, Maryland around 1972 and was



in a bar trying to drink myself into oblivion. The TV was tuned into a program where the host would invite guests to his show and then proceed to make fools out of them. These strange looking people wearing sheets walked in as the next guests on the program. I didn't follow a lot of what they were saying, some religious stuff, but what got my attention was that no matter how hard the program host tried he could not defeat the



Krishna devotees. I said to myself, that these people may look strange but they are really fixed up in their beliefs and are undefeatable.

I returned to Arkansas in 1973. A friend from back East moved there too and we moved into the woods of the Ozarks in northern Arkansas. It was really primitive; a hand built shack with no plumbing or electricity and a small two men tent. He had brought a copy of the Bhagavad-gita with him. When he finished reading it he came to me and said he was only willing to talk to me about our survival or about Krishna. He believed that this philosophy was the truth and he was going to become a devotee. I'd go crazy without anyone to talk to, so I borrowed his Gita and started reading. I was just getting to the 18th chapter when he really started asking for the book back so he could study it more. I had been blown away by all that I had read and wanted to finish the last chapter, but could see how sincere he was in wanting to become a better devotee so I returned the Gita. Shortly after that he decided to go to a temple, so we loaded up the car and headed to Dallas. This was my first actual contact with devotees. It was the summer of 1973 and the Dallas temple was very busy. My friend got shaved up and fit right in. I, on the other hand, wasn't sure what I was doing. Being there was totally blissful and I do not remember being as happy anywhere else. But it just didn't seem to be the place for me. After four days I returned to Arkansas. I was just too attached to the material world and all my pleasures. I had a job waiting, my parents were expecting me to come back and I just couldn't give up my propensity for intoxication and women, but I did become a vegetarian.

From then on my spiritual life was a series of ups and downs. I returned to college to get a degree in forestry in the hope of getting a better paying job so I could afford to buy some land and live a simple life in the country. I went to work for the U.S. Forest Service. I believed I had found the truth about God in the Bhagavad-gita but wasn't able to actually follow the teachings. Nevertheless, my perspective on reality had changed.

I didn't really see another devotee until the latter 1980's when I started occasionally going back to the Dallas temple. Things seemed to have changed at the Temple. There weren't near as many devotees around and I was totally shocked to learn that Srila Prabhupada had left his body. I started sending money to the temple, trying to chant and read some of the many books I had purchased. One devotee I met traveled around teaching cooking classes and he used to stop at my house to rest

from his travels. He taught me to cook and encouraged me by his association. I became a Life Member, but as time passed I stopped going back to the temple in Dallas. I met some devotees who lived in Missouri that had left ISKCON and I visited them off and on. I learned of a break in ISKCON and became totally confused as to what had happened.

As I moved from place to place I always kept Srila Prabhupada's books with me. I knew these books contained all the knowledge I needed and they were my prized possessions. I had finally read all of the Gita but had never attempted to read Srimad-Bhagavatam or Sri Caitanya-caritamrta. One day I would read them, when I could get my life together. I did tell everyone that in case of fire the only important thing to save was Prabhupada's books.

Years passed and I continued my old ways. I had become successful in the material world but had not made any new progress spiritually. My senses and mind pulled me around and I just didn't have the will power to say "no" to intoxication or women. Finally the Lord came to my rescue. I broke the law and went to prison. I had hit rock bottom.



When I first arrived in prison I had the good fortune to meet another devotee inmate, who gave me the address for the ISKCON Prison Ministry. I started writing to Mother Shyama Priya for her association and that started a wonderful friendship both on a spiritual and



personal level. The two years seven months I was in prison was the Lord's blessing on me. He took away all my attachments and provided me the time to chant and

read Srila Prabhupada's books. Of course trying to be a devotee in the Arkansas prison system was a real challenge. The prison units I ended up in didn't seem to have any experience with vegetarians. But I kept up my vegetarian diet and got stricter on myself as time went on. Shyama Priya was of great help to me, sending japa beads and books to read. I got out of prison in February 2008. That August I made a trip to Alachua to finally meet Shyama Priya in person, and be able to go to the Temple. Then the following February I received my initiation, on my 60th birthday, from H.H. Hridayananda das Goswami.

Of course being out of prison has been difficult too. All the old attachments are now available once again. I have not met any devotees in Arkansas, but I have taken shelter of the Holy Names and my spiritual master. I'm retired with free time so I took charge of producing the IPM Freedom Newsletter [till 2019] as a service to others in prison. I bought a small house on a couple of acres in the country where I live alone living a simple life, chanting my rounds and reading Srila Prabhupada's books.

I have been fortunate to be able to make a couple trips to the Dallas temple and get the association of the devotees there. I plan to continue those visits on a regular basis. These trips have resulted in a blessing for people in Arkansas. Several of the devotees I met in Dallas plan to come to visit me in Arkansas with the thought of being able to start some sort of a preaching program here. This is something greatly needed in Arkansas and I look forward to being part of it. It is all Krishna's blessing and I am thankful to have this opportunity to serve our Lord and my spiritual master.

Bhavananda prabhu is now married to a wonderful devotee, Rangavati Devi Dasi, and together they form a very dynamic duo. They started a small temple where many people attend and are introduced to Kṛṣṇa consciousness. Tthey also organize a yearly Ratha-Yatra festival in their area.

# **Book Distribution Stories!**

The following stories were written in 2000. Sankirtan, book distribution, being ageless, these stories are as relishable today as they were then.

#### **Encounters**

He said that he had that one. After a little discussion he said that although he had read the *Science of Self-Realization* he did not have it so he gave a donation and took it. Adi-Purusha asked him if he had ever been to a temple. He replied that he had never met devotees or been to a temple and said, "I just like reading the swamis books". Then Adi gave him and invitation and he said that now he would come to the temple that he knew about it

## Sankirtan Story

I was distributing books at a table at the April Fool's day fair in a local community college. And the table adjacent to us was the pagan church. I overheard a conversation between one of the women behind the table and an older man with a long white beard standing out in the aisle. She was explaining that she was a lesbian and the head of the church and that that was ok and I kind of watched his reaction the whole time through the conversation and he was kind of smiling and looking kind of strange and [he seemed to be] thinking 'what is this woman talking about?' So eventually he said goodbye and started to

walk over to our table and he had not really noticed me dressed in my devotional clothing yet so when he got closer he started to notice that there was someone with a shaven head, dhoti, kurta, bead bag and the whole look. He looked right at me and I looked at him and leaned towards him and [to help him relate to me] with a really serious look on my face I introduced myself by saying. And immediately his face was just a big smile and he was so interested and was asking questions and we just hit it off perfect and he ended up taking a Bhagavad-gita As It Is and giving a donation.

## PHILADELPHIA'S MANTRA LOUNGE FEEDS THE NEEDY DURING PANDEMIC

he Mantra Lounge in Philadelphia, known for its book distribution, has been reaching out to people during the COVID-19 pandemic by feeding the homeless and others in need.

"When the pandemic began in Spring last year, we saw people start to lose their jobs pretty quickly, and remembered Srila Prabhupada's instruction that no one within a ten-mile radius of any ISKCON center should go hungry," says Mangal-Arti Dasi, president of the Mantra Lounge in Fishtown and affiliated Titiksava Karunika Ashram in West Philadelphia.

Devotees had already been feeding university students on campus at Temple, Drexel, West Chester and Rowan universities every week. Now they wanted to help families who were struggling.

"I would see some of the people we had been sharing Krishna consciousness with, and they hadn't eaten anything all day," Mangal-Arti says. "Sometimes they would go on fasts for ten or fifteen days, and tell me, 'Oh, I'm doing a cleanse.' But when you really got to know them, you learned they just didn't have the money to eat three square meals."

Mantra Lounge devotees began by delivering meals to first responders such as doctors, nurses, and police. They then joined forces with local youth, artists' and environmental organizations to connect with families in need, using the infrastructure from their Krishna Foods business to provide free food relief to those who required it.

Mantra Lounge put together a volunteer bubble consisting of ashram residents and a few congregational devotees. Throughout the summer, the team distributed prasadam for four or five hours every Sunday from a table at Malcolm X Park, a central spot near many families in need. Mantra

Lounge also posted an announcement on its website that anyone who needed free meals on weekdays could contact devotees and receive them by delivery.

During the winter, the team has shifted its base and has been distributing about 100 meals from just outside Mantra

Lounge from 10am to 3pm every Sunday. The pre-packaged hot meals are vegan and include a rice dish such as rice pulao, a curry like creamy chickpea, a green salad with dressing such as blueberry vinaigrette, and a dessert such as cake or strawberry halava.

Devotees also deliver directly to families in need from their database during the week, as well as to homeless people in various parts of the city. These have included the now defunct Benjamin Franklin Parkway Homeless Encampment, the area around the Philadelphia Convention Center, and the Kensington neighborhood known for being home to one of the largest open-air drug markets in the United States.

"People are very appreciative," says Mangal-Arti. "One man was lying in the street, in the rain. And despite his state, he got up and tried to express his gratitude. It makes you cry. We have a photo of a little girl saying thank you so much for the prasadam. To know that someone that little is in



need of food is just heart wrenching. And many people in Philly are very God conscious – they keep saying 'God bless you, God bless you.' And they appreciate God's work. When we tell our customers from Krishna Foods what we're doing, they give extra to sponsor ten or twenty meals."

Looking to the future, Mangal-Arti says she could expand to distribute 150 meals a day if supporters in the ISKCON community donated \$500 a week, or \$2,000 per month. Meanwhile, the project is also in need of a final piece of equipment to make its kitchen commercial grade, which will cost \$15,000.

As well as expanding food relief, post-pandemic Mangal-Arti hopes to establish a joint program of free meal delivery along with classes to teach families how to cook and eat healthily; and eventually to teach those who are interested

about Krishna prasadam and bhakti-yoga.

"I would love to see people benefit beyond just getting a free meal," she says.

She adds: "We'll also offer them the option to become a volunteer with our program. People love to be a part of the program that helped them."

As well as their food relief programs, Mantra Lounge devotees are offering virtual Bhagavad-gita, yoga, japa and kirtan workshops via livestream and Zoom during the pandemic, and are distributing Srila Prabhupada's books over the phone.

When I was in West Virginia prison I was given the opportunity to cook the meal for our Gaura Purnima Celebration. It was the one and only special Holiday the prison gave us.






