very month I compose a newsletter solely for the inmates. It is called *Freedom Newsletter* (FN). The inmates really enjoy it. It is printed in color, and Bhranti Dasi folds them, puts them in envelopes, add the stamps, and mail them to 160 inmates. Two devotees, who desire to remain anonymous, sponsor the FN's printing and mailing cost.

A few months ago, a chaplain requested 50 copies to be sent to him directly, and he personally distribute them to the inmates of his Nevada facility every month. He volunteered to be a distributor of transcendental news!

Recently, I decided to include the FN on the IPM website, for devotees to look at and for anyone to print and send to inmates they may be writing to. You can see them at this link:

With this FN, the inmates can keep track of the Vaisnava calendar, read other inmate's writing and artwork, learn about Vaisnava saints, read about different events around the world, such as the first ever Thai bus tour, or food for life distribution in devastated areas.

Thank you so much for this advance copy of the newsletter. It is truly a massive improvement! Much more engaging and very inmate-oriented which the previous was lacking. I COULDN'T BELIEVE you saved one of my ancient earlier

drawings of Srila Prabhupada. That really blew my mind. What a difference from now. Anyway I really like all the inmate quotes and it gives other inmates perspective of where they're at spiritually. 

HOW I CAME TO KRSNA CONSCIOUSNESS

AN INQUIRY INTO LIFE AFTER DEATH LED ME TO A NEW SENSE OF FREEDOM

I want to formally thank you & everyone involved in your prison ministry program. You have provided a means for incarcerated souls to break free from the bondage of self [false self; false ego]. What started out as an inquiry into life after death

led me to a new sense of freedom, one made possible through the service of great atmas, like yourselves. Many people who seek Krishna in here rarely seek Krishna outside of prison, as Srutadeva Prabhu would say, but you can rest assured that I will be participating in temple duties in both Chandler & Tucson [once released].

The magnitude to which your service has gone on to help extends far beyond myself and to elaborate I'd like to tell you my story, which, if you like, have permission to publish in any newsletter.

My spiritual journey began in November 2018 with a search to discover what happens after death. I read many books that didn't click until my sponsor in AA gave me *The Science of Self-Realization* by Srila Prabhupada. Finally, something made sense

and I began to read more from Prabhupada. Jesus says that *ye will know the truth when ye hear it*, and I certainly could feel I was reading something genuine and truthful.

Shortly after I began reading the Bhagavad-gita As

It Is. In 2019 I decided to write you myself and was given Srutadeva Das as my pen pal. I was able to ask questions and learn much more about the Vedas. I was blessed to receive the *Back to Godhead magazine*, *Freedom Newsletter*, and many books, including the Mahabharata.

For a while I was the only bhakta on the yard. Then, in early 2021, I saw another inmate meditating and began a conversation. He was involved in Buddhist Monasteries on the streets and

so we shared interest in Eastern philosophy. We later became good friends, and I gave him my pen pal's address and a few books to read. Now there are two bhaktas on the yard, enough to register with the chaplain, for services.

At this point I had read the Gita four times and the Mahabharata from cover to cover. People on the



yard knew what I was about and knew me from the classes I teach or taught, such as Morning Meditation, A Path to Virtue, and Redefining Success. My release date was coming, and I couldn't let this yard be devoid of Krishna. So I went around the yard to those I knew were spiritual seekers and asked if they would be interested in studying the Gita.

I compiled a list of seven people who were interested in learning more. I wrote to Balabhadra Dasa in Boise and told him my idea to start a study group here and asked his opinion. He said it was an excellent idea and he poured out his energy into helping us get this thing started. About three months later, the seven inmates interested in study received their own copy of the Bhagavad-gita, and two more books as well. Bhakta Wes and I now lead a Gita study group every Saturday.


What's more, I also reached out to the Tucson temple to see if they would be interested in volunteering service here at Graham. I got in touch with Sandamini Dasi, the temple president, and she sounded very sincere and interested. I linked her to our complex chaplain and soon there will be a community of Krishna Consciousness inmates to attend Kirtan and further their study in the presence of devotees.

What seemed impossible at first, started to become very real. This yard was completely void of Krishna Consciousness less than three years ago, and now we have a community of seven inmates studying the Gita, with volunteer devotees on their way. If Srila Prabhupada can start a global movement with nothing, surely a sincere inmate can gather a group of inmates in prison for a higher purpose.

I ready myself for release now, feeling like I did something to make a difference. The Krishna Consciousness that began here will continue in my absence and for me there is no greater joy. Hare Krishna! Jaya!

PANEL DISCUSSION IN NEW JERSEY

In March 2024, one of our IPM volunteers, Govindanandini dasi, Chaplain Woolever invited to participate in a panel discussion at Saint Peter's Prep School in Jersey City, New Jersey.

Below is her invitation to Govindanandini prabhu.

Before I dive into it, I just want to say how moved I am by your work. It is encouraging to know that people who find themselves intertwined in our criminal justice system have access to people like you.

Each spring, St. Peter's has an Arrupe Justice Initiative. Inspired by Jesuit Pedro Arrupe. The annual event strives to raise awareness about different justice concerns and even strategize about how to become involved. Our Arrupe theme for this year is pilgrimaging in and with the prison system. I am working with twenty reflective upperclassmen to create a week of reflections and activities to help guide our Prep community on an introductory journey into the realities of the US prison system. They are really interested in learning from people who have experienced being in prison

firsthand. We understand that rejoining society after being incarcerated comes with many challenges, and thought that we could potentially get closer to the real voice of people who have or



are in prison in a panel discussion with persons who have provided religious and spiritual care to inmates.

The school itself is affiliated with the Catholic tradition, but students were enthused by the idea of hearing from people of other religious traditions.

Below is a description of the event itself, by Govindanandini prabhu.

I have been one of the ISKCON Prison Ministry volunteers since 2013, corresponding with prison inmates via letters, email and phone calls. I assist them in navigating their spiritual journey using Srila Prabhupada's books and Krishna Consciousness. My role involves writing letters, answering questions, encouraging and supporting inmates who show interest in reading Srila Prabhupada's books.

Recently I was invited to participate in a panel discussion at Saint Peter's Prep School in



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Jersey City, New Jersey. There, on Wednesday, March 20th, I had the opportunity to speak about ISKCON Prison Ministry's contributions. The Catholic High School arranged a program to introduce their students to the realities of the US prison system and raise awareness about the challenges faced by inmates through an interfaith discussion panel. This panel included individuals who have experience working with the prison population for religious and spiritual care. I represented the Hindu faith and ISKCON Prison Ministry on this panel, alongside a Christian Pastor, a Muslim Imam, and a New Jersey Assemblyman. I elaborated on how ISKCON Prison Ministry provides a holistic spiritual support program to inmates and helps create a platform for them to practice the 'spiritual dimension' in their lives. I also shared how the Ministry volunteers celebrate

inmates' spiritual progress by publishing —in the monthly *Freedom Newsletter* —their devotional expressions through writings, poems, and art. It was a proud moment for me to speak about the IPM volunteer community, which serves the mission of Srila Prabhupada, as encapsulated in his quote, "The holistic cure for society's ills, both individually and collectively, is to give an equal chance to all to practice spirituality and to understand the love of God."

Due to the nature of this student assembly, there wasn't much scope for comments or questions afterwards, though the atmosphere was one of appreciation. The organizers were very grateful and happy that the Hindu faith was represented there, so that their students could have the perspective from a non-Abrahamic religion as well.

I have a gentleman who has been bringing in your newsletter and other materials for years for self-study and he was wondering what is available to be sent in for communal use, like DVDs/music/or lectures, that our facility could have available for group worship. We have been talking for a few months and he is hoping to get something started at our Religious Center sometime in the next year. I browsed your website and did not readily see an order form for the items he was talking about, but did see a mention of items on the home page. Thank you for your time and I look forward to hearing back.

1/16/24

We can accept all of the items you are able to offer. Just to let you know we have basically four facilities in one. We have the Reception center, the Treatment center, a Medical/Mental health center, and a maximum-security center; all of these groups do not mix or rarely mix due to the necessities of each population. I can share the items you are able to send our way so the men here can have access to the information if you are limited to what can be sent to a single facility. We have a new blue-ray player that accommodates several media formats so CDs, MP3s, and DVDs will all work. The men here are allowed hardbound books, thank you for asking. While I have not had anyone recently ask for books like these in Spanish our Spanish speaking population has been on the rise this last year so I would say that would be a good item to have. Any backorder magazines would be wonderful as well since all of the information would be new to the men in

here. The 18-book volume would be helpful for the Reception and Treatment sides I would think; we might need to revisit this in about 2 or 3 years when our hospital ward is completed.

The men across my facility love having newsletters and we make sure there is room for the newsletters for the men to grab. Since this will be a fairly new belief for many of the men I would think about 50 would be good for now, but we will update you as time goes. We will also make use of our libraries here to reach as many men as possible with your publication..

2/16/24

This is exciting news for sure! Thank you very much for sending these as I know some of the men who have recently asked about the material will be excited when I have the chance to inform them. Thank you for the kindness and compassion for the gentlemen under my care.

3/1/24

We have received a few of the boxes so far and the men here who are interested in ISKCON have been extremely excited for the new material. Thank you very much as this has brought great joy to the men who sincerely wish to practice and learn.

3/4/24

I am the Chaplain at a juvenile facility in the Northern region of Indiana. We spoke about 18 months ago, as I was serving in a nearby adult facility (Miami Correctional). I truly appreciate the magazines, DVDs, books and prayer beads you provided at that time. The individuals that received those items were truly grateful, as I constantly rotated magazines around the facility for them. We had about 6 that were Hindu, and many others who were curious of the beliefs.

As we don't have the largest population of Hindu or Buddhist students, we do have a few and I was hoping you could provide a small number of books for us. At this time, I have one Mahabharata, and 3 books on the Hindu beliefs for the students. Being so limited, I can't really give the books to the students. Is there a chance I could ask for a few copies of the Mahabharata, and/or the Ramayana? This would be to give to the students as a gift as they in-process and allow them to keep these books as a gift from the donor organization.

We only receive 2-4 students a year that define as Hindu/Buddhist, but I believe it would mean a lot for them to have these items to support their faith beliefs. I don't believe we can use a large number of magazines, but maybe 5 or 6 to hold onto for the students to read in the Chapel.

I have 2 library sections. 1 is full of over 1,000 books for the incarcerated to have. Then I have another ith about 200 books, I call the Theology Corner, where they can come to chapel just to read about the religions, but can't take them.

That is a great blessing. Always a gift of enlightenment for others. We would enjoy the magazines, the incarcerated students can learn a great deal from them. Some of our students are not well educated, so a magazine may be better for them.


