



PRABHUPADA SPEAKS OUT —On Brainwashing

The following conversation between His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada and one of his disciples took place in 1977.

In October 1977, a Queens, New York, a grand jury leveled charges of extortion and "imprisonment through brainwashing" against New York ISKCON Temple President Adi-Kesava Swami. In mid-February, one month before State Supreme Court Justice John J. Leahy threw the case out of court, Adi-Kesava traveled to ISKCON's temple in Mayapur, India, to take advice from his spiritual master, His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada. The following excerpts from their conversations on the subject of "brainwashing" are reproduced from the journal of Srila Prabhupada's secretary.

Srila Prabhupada said, "The whole world is under a misconception, and we are giving them knowledge. And yet they say we are brainwashing. People in general do not know that the body is valuable only as long as the soul is there. Therefore, their brain is



rubbish and must be washed, or human civilization is lost."

Srila Prabhupada gave this argument: "We are not brainwashing, but brain-giving. Where is your brain? You must first *have* a brain; then we can talk of washing it. You don't know who you are. Take a dead man and a living man—what is the difference? Because you do not know, you have no brain, and therefore you misunderstand. We can give evidence in court from the Bhagavad-gita to show this. We can prove that you have no brain. You are like the cats and dogs, even if you pose as a philosopher. For centuries this information has been missing: tatha dehantara praptih, 'The soul is changing, one body after another.' A person who has a brain will understand this simple logic. The body is changing from childhood to youth. When the important thing, the soul, is missing, it is a dead body. Where is your brain to understand it? Arjuna was chastised for this by Krishna, who said, 'You have no brain, and you are lamenting about the body.' They don't know the real thing, despite their big talk. They say life is a combination of chemicals; but then mix them and let life come. You can't do it. You are cheating people. You have no brain at all."

Adi-Kesava Swami [playing the part of an opponent]: "But I have a brain; therefore, I am able to talk with you."

Srila Prabhupada: What is the difference between that talking and the barking of a dog? A dog is alert to someone coming from a distance, even more than a man. Your talking is not proof of a brain.

Adi-Kesava Swami: "But we have art and science." **Srila Prabhupada:** Whatever you have, you cannot answer the ultimate question. Within the body is the real power. Because *he is* there, the body is changing. The body is like a dress. You should quote the *Bhagavad-gita*.

Adi-Kesava Swami: Another complaint is that they say we make a person lose his identity by brainwashing him.

Srila Prabhupada: But who are *they?* They do not know who they *are*. They are identifying the self with the body. *That* is brainwashing.

Adi-Kesava Swami: Well, they may say that "all this discussion of the soul is beyond our knowledge." Srila Prabhupada: "It is beyond our knowledge" means you can't understand.

February 19, 1977 [journal entry]: This morning Srila Prabhupada called for all the *sannyasis* [fully renounced preachers of Krishna consciousness]. "Be

convinced of this," he said. "I am saying that everyone in the world has no brain, and we only are brain-giving. Why do I say this? Because I challenge the world's scientists and great thinkers: 'You just produce a machine like the body.' But they cannot. This machine is produced by God. Actually, God Himself does not make this machine. His servant, the material energy, makes the machine: Just see His intelligence. 'The Supreme Lord is seated in everyone's heart,' says the Bhagavad-gita. I am an ordinary man, and yet I can get things done—not directly, but by asking my disciples. So why can't God do this? The machine of the body is made by His material nature. How is it made? They don't know. If I challenge them to produce such a machine, they cannot. How this machine is being made by maya, or the material energy, we shall give them the brain to know. We should not be dull and simply accept whatever the scientists say, by noting, 'Yes, you are right.' No. At every step we must say, 'You are wrong. You have no brain."

Adi-Kesava Swami: Well, they say they have actually created a machine which is more complex than a man. Srila Prabhupada: But that machine is worked by another man. And who made that man? They cannot even understand God's material nature, what to speak of the Supreme.

Adi-Kesava Swami: When we argue like this, they just change the subject.

Srila Prabhupada: Why do you let them? Capture them.

Adi-Kesava Swami: Well, they will say, "You are talking of religion...

Srila Prabhupada: We are not talking of religion! You don't know religion. We are talking of machines. An animal has no religion. Later we can talk of that. Now talk of machines. Religion is far away from you. And even if you could manufacture one living machine, these machines are now being created in such numbers that you are trying to stop their creation by abortion. So, so many are already being produced by nature. If you can create one, what will be your credit?

Adi-Kesava Swami: They will say, "We will make a better machine than God has made."

Srila Prabhupada: Oh. You cannot capture a garter snake, and now you are saying you will catch a cobra. **Adi-Kesava Swami:** "Well, you can't make a brain either."

Srila Prabhupada: We don't say that we have a great brain. We are a servant. Our Master will show the brain. But you are a godless rascal. You have the onus of proof on you.

BRAINWASHING ACCUSATIONS and "DEPROGRAMMING"

he 60s and 70s saw a proliferation of cults in America; the *Moonies*, the *Children of God*, the *Rajneesh Movement*, the *Manson Family*, etc. Understandably, the American public became weary and suspicious of these imposters who were dangerous and sometimes murderous. Many of these cults left a trail of victims behind them. In response to this wave

of charlatans plaguing America, a new phenomenon was created; the "deprogrammers", who were charlatans themselves. Parents of cult members, desperate to extricate their children from a dangerous situation, would employ such deprogrammers who would kidnap their adult children, hold them against their will, and submit them to the same kind of ill treatment they were accusing the cults to impose; sleep deprivation, brainwashing, intimidation, isolation, and the like.

Indiscriminately, a lot of people threw all "new" religious groups in the same quack pile, without serious inquiry, or without any inquiry at all. So when, in 1966, the newly incorporated International Society for Krishna Consciousness (ISKCON) —the "Hare Krishnas" —came onto the scene, they were viewed by some as just another new cult plaguing the country and corrupting their youth. However, respected, renowned scholars, upon studying Śrīla Prabhupāda's books and meeting him in person, developed a great respect for his impressive scholarship/erudition, and deep devotion to the cultural and spiritual movement of Lord Chaitanya. His books were held in such high regard (they still are), that universities all over the country acquired them for their libraries and incorporated them in their course studies.

Some of the parents of the early devotees also employed "deprogrammers" to talk some sense into their "lost" sons and daughters. A few devotees, after escaping these deprogrammers, filed lawsuits against the people who had kidnapped them.

On May 20th, 1977, the *Washington Post*, published an article by Janis Jonhson entitled "**DEPROGRAM**," in which it was stated.

"She [Donna Seidenberg Bavis] was kept prisoner for 33 days by "deprogrammers" who sought to rid her of her beliefs by depriving her of sleep and subjecting her to long, ritualized harangues against the sect. Donna Seidenberg Bavis, 24, alleged that her captors, who

were engaged by her mother for the deprogramming, stayed with her constantly throughout the 33 days, even accompanying her to the bathroom on occasion. She said she was kept in locked quarters and compelled to watch them burn Hare Krishna relics [like her prayer beads] during a month of "terror and hysteria."

Bavis, who returned to the sect in March after

pretending to be successfully deprogrammed, then married another devotee, Edward Bavis [her fiancé]. She had been confined by the deprogrammers under a "conservatorship," a court-sanctioned form of guardianship usually applied to senile people who cannot manage their own affairs."

Donna was told repeatedly that she could not escape and that she would he held captive "until she was 'deprogrammed' from her religious beliefs and associations 'however long it takes,'" the suit said.

Eventually, she began to feign acceptance of the "deprogramming" and was subjected to a telephone "stress test" by an unknown man who said he was analyzing her voice to determine whether she was telling the truth. She passed it."

There was another lawsuit where a New York State Supreme Court judge dismissed "mind control" indictments against the Hare Krishna sect on grounds that the charges were "a direct and blatant violation of the defendants' First Amendment rights.

On March 18th, 1977, The *New York Times* published an article by Murray Schumach, entitled, "Judge Rejects Charges of 'Brainwashing' Against Hare Krishna Aides." The article states,

"The Hare Krishna movement was called a "bona fide religion" yesterday by State Supreme Court justice in Queens who threw out two indictments against officials of the movement. The indictments had charged them with illegal imprisonment of two members and attempted extortion from the father of one of the believers.

'The entire and basic Issue before this court,' said Justice John J. Leahy, 'is whether or not the two alleged victims in this case and the defendants will be allowed to practice the religion of their choice—and this must be answered with a resounding affirmative.'



The indictments, handed up last year, were the first of their kind against the Hare Krishna movement. They charged that Angus Murphy, the president of the New York temple of the religion, and

Harold Conley, the supervisor of women at the temple, held Edward Shapiro and Merylee Kreshour in the temple illegally, by brainwashing them.

Legal and ethical questions have arisen from intensive efforts to "deprogram" members of Hare Krishna and other movements. The main method is to separate the follower from the group and to subject him to long periods of counter persuasion. Among the controversial and well-known deprogrammers is Ted Patrick, a Californian who was released recently from prison on kidnapping charges resulting from a deprograming case.

'The Hare Krishna religion is a bona fide religion with roots in India that go back thousands of years', Justice Leahy said, 'It behooved Merylee Kreshour and Edward Shapiro to follow the tenets of that faith and their inalienable right to do so will not be trampled upon.'


'The separation of church and state must be maintained. We are, and must remain, a nation of laws, not of men. The presentment and indictment by the grand jury was in direct and blatant violation of defendants' constitutional rights.'

The judge pointed out that the prosecution, during the hearing last month, had conceded that no physical force had been used by the defendants against Miss Kreshour or the younger Mr. Shapiro, adding:

'The said two individuals entered the Hare Krishna movement voluntarily and' submitted themselves voluntarily to the regimen, rules and regulations of said so-called Hare Krishna religion, and it is also conceded that the alleged victims were not in any way physically restrained from leaving the defendant organization." On the allegation of brainwashing, he said:

"'It appears to the court that the people rest their case on an erroneous minor premise to arrive at a fallacious conclusion. The record is devoid of one specific allegation of a misrepresentation or an act of deception on the part of any defendant.'

Justice Leahy, who stressed that his decision was intended as a "dire caveat to prosecutorial agencies throughout the length and breadth of the land," cited the constitutional guarantee of freedom of religion said; 'The freedom of religion is not to be abridged because it is unconventional in its beliefs and practices or because it is approved or disapproved by the mainstream of society or more conventional religion. Without this proliferation and freedom to follow the dictates of one's own conscience in his search for and approach to God, the freedom of religion will 'be a meaningless right as provided for in the Constitution.'



INTERESTING TIDBIT:

In the dictionary, the word "cult" doesn't have a negative connotation. The first definition is, "a system of religious veneration and devotion directed toward a particular figure or object."

Śrīla Prabhupāda uses the word cult according to that definition. For example, in the purport of SB 2.4.18, he writes,

"Without any reference to the particular custom of a country, one can be accepted to the Vaisnava cult spiritually, and there is no hindrance in the transcendental process. (...) According to the cult of devotion, generally known as the Vaisnava cult, there is no bar against anyone's advancing in the matter of God realization."

And in the introduction to Śrīmad-Bhāgavatam, Śrīla Prabhupāda writes,

"Therefore all the missionary activities of the Lord are to be understood to be on the spiritual plane, and as such the cult of Çré Caitanya Mahäprabhu, or the cult of Bhāgavata-dharma, has nothing to do with mundane affairs, sociology, politics, economic development or

any such sphere of life. Çrémad-Bhägavatam is the purely transcendental urge of the soul. (...) The cult of Caitanya philosophy is richer than any other."

The second dictionary definition of the word "cult" is: "a relatively small group of people having religious beliefs or practices regarded by others as strange or sinister."

Noteworthy is that this definition, "regarded by others as sinister", doesn't imply that a group is factually sinister, but that it is perceived that way. In some cases,


it is a fact that some groups do mislead and even harm their members, and it is in those cases that the word "cult" has a negative connotation.

Interestingly, the opposite of the word "cult" is "mainstream" or "conventional." And so, genuine spiritual movements that are "new" to the public, and seemingly unconventional, can be perceived negatively by those who are ignorant of their long, rich, and well documented history.
